





The next English Department **biweekly Student Reading,** is tomorrow, 29 September, at 4 pm in Ketchum 212.






Poet, translator and essayist, Susan Briante will read from her work tomorrow, Thursday, October 20 at 3 pm in KH 113. Briante has published two collections of poetry: *Utopia Minus* and *Pioneers in the Study of Motion* (both with Ahsahta Press) and her poetry has appeared in more than 50 journals. She has also published a series of essays on the relationship between place and cultural memory, and is currently working on a lyric investigation of the stock

Briante is an assistant professor of creative writing and literature at the University of Texas at Dallas. 
The next English Department **biweekly Student Reading,** is Thursday 10 November at 4 pm in Ketchum 212.

On March 29, **Peter Ramos** presented a paper, "Introspective Brown Buffalo to Revolting Cockroach: Oscar Zeta Acosta's Thoreauvian Model" at the College English Association (CEA) conference in Richmond, VA. (Peter notes: <u>Oscar Zeta Acosta</u> was a famous Chicano lawyer and activist who was also a good friend of Hunter Thompson. Other good news for Peter is the receipt of both a Provost Incentive Grant and a fellowship from the Virginia Center for the Creative Arts. He will be in residency there for two weeks in June, reading, writing, thinking and sweating poetry.

Lisa Berglund will also be in Virginia in June, as she has been accepted into the University of Virginia's Rare Book School one-week intensive course on "The History of the Book in America, c. 1700-1830."

On April 16, **Ann Colley** will present a paper, "A Chaos of Skin: Natural History Collecting in Victorian Britain," at the Popular Culture Conference in Boston, MA . Her paper refutes current opinion that equates the business of collecting with Britain's imperialistic imperative to possess and dominate foreign territories. She believes that a perspective which equates the imperialistic rage for control or authority with the collecting and classifying of natural history specimens begs correction, for such a point of view does not necessarily correspond to the actual experiences recorded by Victorian collectors. For the Victorians, Walter Benjamin's sense that every passion for collection borders on the chaotic was a reality. Rather than represent the metropole's orderly authority, a majority of natural history specimens, especially skins, existed within what Benjamin identifies as a dialect of disorder and order.

On March 17, at the NEMLA conference in Rochester, **Heidi Dietz-Faletti** read a paper entitled "Words as Destabilized Signifiers in Godard's *Vivre sa Vie* and *Made in U. S. A.*"
