UPCOMING EVENTS



African-American studies scholar and poet Aldon Lynn Nielsen, the George and Barbara Kelly Professor of American Literature at Penn State, will give a **reading from his latest book of poetry**, *Tray* (Make Now Books, 2017), on Friday, October 12 at 2 pm. (location TBA). Trayvon Martin's death at the hand of vigilante George Zimmerman in February 2012 sparked the Black Lives Matter movement, which has gained attention over the past six years in its efforts to publicize and oppose the high number of African-American fatalities that result from

unjustified public violence. Dr. Nielsen's collection gives voice to Trayvon Martin by reimagining his encounter with Zimmerman through black music and the clashes of archetypal figures. The book's overall narrative positions Martin as one of the latest participants in the centuries-long conflict over racial identity that has defined American society. The individual poems examine United States racial history both in terms of the artistic innovations it has produced and the brutality that persists.

Please encourage students to attend. JENNIFER RYAN also is looking for a class for Dr. Nielsen to visit on that Friday morning. If you teach a course with relevant material and are interested in having him come to lead a discussion, please let her know.

The English Department welcomes two new fulltime faculty to the English Education program: assistant professor KRISTEN PASTORE-CAPUANO and fulltime lecturer KATHARINE MACRO.

KAREN SANDS-O'CONNOR had a busy summer. In June, she went to the UK to work on her online exhibition of Black British Children's Literature (opening soon on a computer near you) and to help the Centre for Literacy in Primary Education write their report, *Reflecting Realities: A Survey of Ethnic Representation within UK Children's Literature 2017*. In July, she began consulting for Amnesty International UK on a project concerning Children's Rights and Children's Literature, and went to New York City to work in the Schomburg on a project on Black Panther Liberation Schools' reading material; the trip was partly funded by a Diversity Research grant from the Children's Literature Association. Finally, her article, "Punk Primers and Reggae Readers: Music and Politics in British Children's

Literature" appeared in Global Studies of Childhood's August/ September issue.

New poems by JOEY NICOLETTI, including one about Buffalo's Gypsy Parlor, have been published in <u>Green Hills</u> <u>Literary Lantern</u> and <u>Cacti Fur</u>, and new nonfiction in <u>Ovunque</u> <u>Siamo: New Italian-</u> <u>American Writing</u>.

TIM BRYANT published



an essay, "Free Play and the Prescriptive End Games of Orson Scott Card," in *Children's Play in Literature: Investigating the Strengths and the Subversions of the Playing Child,* a volume in Routledge's series *Studies in Childhood, 1700 to the Present.*

KIM CHINQUEE'S fiction collection *Shot Girls* has been released. Her publisher, Ravenna Press, will publish her sixth book, *C'mon*, in Fall 2019. She has an author interview up at <u>Coffin Bell Journal</u> and her short story, "The Cookie Room" will appear in the first print anthology of *Coffin Bell Journal*. Her flash fiction "C'mon" will appear in <u>NOON</u>'s 20th Anniversary Issue (March 2019); this is KIM's 18th consecutive appearance in <u>NOON</u>. Twelve of her flash fictions will appear in the third anniversary issue of <u>Jellyfish Review</u> on October 14; three in the inaugural print issue of <u>Faded Out</u>; and two—"I Was On the Second Floor" and "No One Was With Him"—in the Norton Anthology <u>New Micro: Exceptionally</u> *Short Fiction,* edited by James Thomas and Robert Scotellaro. KIM also is chairing two panels at the AWP Conference in Portland, OR next year.



On August 28, AIMEE LEVESQUE hosted a panel at the WNED studio as part of <u>The Great American Read</u>. The topic, "What makes a book a classic? Is it how many generations read it in high school? Can we call the Harry Potter series a classic now, or is it too soon?" was presented via Facebook Live. KIM CHINQUEE also was interviewed for WNED/WBFO's The Great American Read: What Makes a Great Book? documentary screening.

MARK FULK completed two projects this summer: four critical introductions to relatively obscure eighteenth-century novels that are being reproduced in a database of all eighteenth-century fiction (forthcoming from Cambridge University Press) and an essay on May Sarton (and others, including Ellen Corby) and the representation of stroke for an upcoming collection in Disability Studies to be published by Gale University Press.



JOEY NICOLETTI is giving a poetry reading



As previously reported, KIM CHINQUEE, AIMEE LEVESQUE, and TOM REIGSTAD participated in The Great American Read, which aired on PBS in late spring through early fall. The eight-part series explores and celebrates the power of reading, told through the



prism of America's 100 best-loved novels (as chosen in a national survey). AIMEE conducted a twoperson panel interview that included live callers, and participated in the final discussion when the winning book was announced. KIM and TOM were interviewed by Buffalo and Erie County Public Library director Mary Jean Jakubowski about what makes a great novel.




